Pilots interested in formation flying should plan to attend a formation ground school led by Dave Guggemos on 19 Jan in our hangar classroom. This is not to be confused with the two day mandatory ground school to fly a CAF airplane in 2019 that will be 16-17 Feb. Watch for further updates soon on the Feb ground school.

The rides program is still proving popular and we appreciate the support of pilots and other volunteers to get these valuable fundraising outreach flights completed. Our coordinator of the rides program position is currently open and we are asking for a volunteer to take over coordination and scheduling.

Future flight operations in the Houston area will require the addition of ADS-B to the transponder system of all aircraft. The BT-13 is the only one of our aircraft currently equipped with ADS-B. Wing Staff has selected the AT-6 as the next aircraft to be modified with ADS-B. The N3N will follow and we are looking at the possibility of doing that modification in-house.

Pilot sponsors and other volunteers can help during winter maintenance as directed by the Maintenance Officer. Please help where you can.

Happy New Year to all the Houston Wing Members who actually read this.

Seems the New Year is a good time for reflection on the past. Most of you do not know that I

The left front is resealed, but has a bad screw hole to be repaired in the access cover before fuel can be added. I am now back on the left fuel flow problem and will be entering the rear tanks after the fronts are complete. The PT-19 is still having the fuselage wood fitted and prepared for final finishing. After that is complete, the fuselage will be ready for covering. The electrical system is being reworked, and also the seats.

And on to projects:

This time of year I am getting in full swing for the 2019 Houston Wing Hangar Dance. This project is a special one for me. I am well aware that most are not dancers in this unit. I also know you are being hit up for membership, and the awards dinner this time of year also. I am too. The dance is slightly later this year on Sat 23 Feb 2019. The new project is going to be considered an "Interactive STEM Aviation Museum." The cost is projected to be between \$500,000 and \$600,000 with a completion date of April 2022. Museum Moment

Museum Donations

Our museum has reached the stage where we have to be more careful about items what we accept for display. Our museum currently has a great collection on display but we continue to look for items that will fit within what we are trying to do from an educational point of view. We are also excited when people find us and want to have their family members memorabilia displayed in our museum. The fact of the matter is that we have a full museum and a lot of items in storage so we are now only accepting items that we feel we can display in the future. (Accepting donations that we know we will probably never display is not good for us or for the families who donated the items.)

When contacted by potential donors we meet with them and review the items they wish to donate and then let them know if the items will be displayed immediately or hopefully in the future. We also let them know if the items do not fit into our museum plan or scope so will probably not be displayed.

We would like to ask our Wing members to not accept donations of materials for the museum without checking with the museum staff members (Sam Hoynes, Chuck Waters or James Buser) first. We have recently been contacted by three families with items to donate from their parents WWII service. Two of these were B-17 pilots and one was a transport pilot during the war.

The first person was Brett Babbitt who has donated many items from his father Captian Jack R. Babbitt. These items include a dress summer uniform, photos, flight records, pilot training documents and pilot training class photos. This is a great collection and something we can make an interesting display from. (Several of these items will go on display immediately and others will be put together to tell the story of this WWII veteran.)



The museum staff will meet with the other potential donors in the next few weeks.

HOUSTON WING MEMBERSHIP HANGAR FUND RAISING PROGRAM

The Houston Wing has embarked on an important milestone in the history of the wing. As part of the CAF, we are stewards of WWII aviation history. The Houston Wing will be constructing a new hangar on our newly purchased lot, B-6. The new hangar will house a museum incorporating our current and new artifacts as well as Science, Technology, Education and Math (STEM) activities that will engage curious minds. Also planned is a new meeting space than can be used for event rentals and of course aircraft. The wing owns the lot and it is now time to raise funds to build the hangar. Estimates for the concrete pad, metal hangar with full size door run in the \$350K – 400K range. We are starting with a members exclusive fundraising drive program. The goal is to raise \$125,000 from member donations. This internal program will assist our marketing team next year by showing our personal commitment to the new project as they seek outside donations.

The donation program is modeled after the aircraft sponsor program outlined in the CAF Unit Manual. It will be composed of three donation levels:

1. Hangar Full Sponsor - \$3500

The Highest Member Donation Level of Support for the New Hangar Project

2. Hangar Constructor Sponsor- \$1750

A Second Level of Donations Where Members Show Their Significant Support for the New Hangar Project

3. Hangar Supporting Sponsor - \$350

The Third Level of Donations That Allows Members to Support the New Hangar Project

A member can start at say the Supporting Sponsor spot, have his/her name on the Supporting Sponsor Plaque. As they add to their donation over time, he/she can move up to Restoration Sponsor and so on. Their nameplate will then be moved to the appropriate plaque. Like the Aircraft Sponsor Program, if someone were to make a larger donation, they would have multiple Full Sponsorships. Double, triple and so on...This happened in the past when we needed a new engine for the N3N. The wing did not have sufficient funds available at the time so some of the sponsor pilots donated additional full sponsorships to help cover the cost of the new engine. The Houston Wing also donated a full pilot sponsorship to Bluebonnet Belle when she needed a new engine a few years ago.

The Wing will be purchasing plaques showing names of our member donors and the levels they have supported. Any donation is welcome. There are several ways to make a hangar donation. One is to add it to your wing membership renewal form under 'other'. Another way is to send a donation check to the finance officer. In both cases

note 'HANGAR FUND' on the paperwork or check so we know what it's for.



Dave Eagan will be the Member Hangar Fund Administrator. He will keep track of the donations and keep the plaques updated accordingly.

I would like to thank everyone in advance for helping out the Houston Wing with this major milestone.
