The Wing would like to recognize **Dave Guggemos** for organizing the formation training and scheduling for the Houston
Wing. He continues to work with instructor pilots to incorporate training with flyover events whenever possible. He frequently participates in these events as well, volunteering the use of his personal aircraft in support of the Wing.

We'd also like to recognize **Chris Walker** for doing the lion's share of the N3N rides as well as attending many of the Wings flying events. He has driven four hours each direction from his home to fulfill N3N rides which have been our mainstay this past year for the program. The N3N has always been a visitor's favorite, and Chris's willingness to go the extra mile (or 200) has helped many of them create a lifetime memory associated with the aircraft, the Wing and the CAF.

Colonel of the Year

Our Colonel of the Year for 2018 is **Craig Pridgeon**. Craig has continued work on the R985 engine display, bringing in new volunteers as this project moves toward its end goal of turning a dirty home for spiders into a top-notch museum display. In

addition, when it was determined that the PT-19 center section had to be rebuilt, Craig stepped up to construct a work stand and led the effort to disassemble and catalog the leading edge wooden frames. This has saved the Wing at least half of the \$40,000 estimate given by a local repair facility. Craig was also instrumental in vetting several catering companies for the Dinner with Patton event. He has found a company that we hope to continue a good relationship with for future events. The Wing has been very fortunate to have Craig's many talents this year.





Operations Update



Houston Wing has been hard at work completing ground training for formation flight and planning for the mandatory Annual Ground School 16-17 Feb. This ground school to fly a

CAF airplane in 2019 will be 16-17 Feb. Start time for pilots will be 0900 on 16-17 and those interested in supporting PX/Ride/barnstorming operations will have their own ground school after the Wing monthly meeting on Sunday, 17 Feb. Contact Sam Bulger if you want to attend his classes on Sunday.

Upcoming flight operations include a flyover of the AJCA Golf Tournament on 18 Feb and our support of the annual Lock-N-Load Sporting Clays Tournament that supports the Texas Sentinels Foundation for wounded military veterans on 23 Mar.

Denise Walker has volunteered to take over the Tour Planning duties for coordination and scheduling Houston Wing tours. Operations is looking forward to all the help we can get on planning!

Future flight operations in the Houston area will require the addition of ADS-B to the transponder system of all aircraft. Wing Staff has selected the AT-6 as the next aircraft to be modified with ADS-B. We are coordinating to enable the Annual Inspection and ADS-B modification during the spring operations period. The N3N will follow next.

Pilot sponsors and other volunteers can help during winter maintenance as directed by the Maintenance Officer. Please help where you can.

Maintenance



Greetings once again fellow Houston Wing members! I shall vary from the usual topic of the aircraft for a few moments and wanted to remind you the hangar dance is just a few days away. I am now

working hard on it, and with cooperation from the weather, it will be a very good fun night. I want to thank in advance all my helpers and look forward to another excellent night. I still have some tickets left to sell. If you enjoy good vintage music and some fun people, you might consider just coming out to see it.

I also alluded to some excellent hard working folks we have as members, and on my maintenance team, I would like to let the whole unit know exactly how amazing it is. We have perhaps the very best sheet metal structural mechanic in the world on the team in Suzie Bredlau. We have electrical expertise in Stan Turner. We have three airframe and engine mechanics with inspection authorizations. And I am one of them, and also have more than 30 years experience as mechanic / inspector working daily in the GA market. Museum Moment

Museum Item of the Month Ice Order Card

We recently acquired a large collection of WWII memorabilia belonging to Captain Jack Babbitt who was a C-46 pilot during WWII. This collection consisted of uniforms, photos, books and a lot of other WWII era items.

One of the more unusual items was an "Ice Order Card" which would be put outside of a house and would indicate the amount of ice needed when the Iceman made his deliveries.


These blocks of ice would be used in an "Icebox" which was used to keep food fresh before the refrigerator. These Iceboxes were still in wide use throughout the U.S. during WWII.

The Ice Order Card on display shows #10, #25, #50 and #100 and indicates the number of pounds of ice to be delivered to the home. This card was from the French Ice Company in Drumright, Oklahoma.

This unusual Ice Order Card is now on display in the Museum's Home Front display cabinet. -Sam Hoynes

<u>Pattison Elementary Field Trip</u> <u>Thursday, May 16 and Friday May 17</u>

We will be hosting 175 Pattison Elementary Fifth Grade students for their annual field trip over these two days in May. During the field trip we break the students into four sessions with less than 50 students over two days. One group will arrive at 9 and will leave at 11 and another arrives at 11:30 leaving at 1:30 both days (exact timing may vary some but this is the basic plan.) During each of these field trip sessions we break the students into 5 groups of less than 10 kids each and we rotate them through five educational stations spending 18 minutes at each station.

The five stations are:

- 1. Museum (concentrating on the Home Front),
 - 2. C-60 & Parachute Exercise,
 - 3. AT-6 Cockpit tour,
- 4. BT-13 lesson on how an aircraft flies, and
- 5. Aircraft Recognition exercise and showing them the other aircraft.

If possible we also try to get one of our pilots to come and start and taxi the AT-6 so the kids can hear these wonderful old engines run, but this is not always possible.

These school field trips are one of our Wing's primary annual educational activities during the year and they require 8-10 of our people to do them properly.

If you would like to get involved in these activities and think you can get free to help on one or both of the scheduled days of this field trip let me know and we will train you

on what to do during these field trips. The kids are great and the field trips are a lot of fun.

HOUSTON WING MEMBERSHIP HANGAR FUND RAISING PROGRAM

The Houston Wing has embarked on an important milestone in the history of the wing. As part of the CAF, we are stewards of WWII aviation history. The Houston Wing will be constructing a new hangar on our newly purchased lot, B-6. The new hangar will house a museum incorporating

our current and new artifacts as well as Science, Technology, Education and Math (STEM) activities that will engage curious minds. Also planned is a new meeting space than can be used for event rentals and of course aircraft. The wing owns the lot and it is now time to raise funds to build the hangar. Estimates for the concrete pad, metal hangar with full size door run in the \$350K – 400K range. We are starting with a members exclusive fundraising drive program. The goal is to raise \$125,000 from member donations. This internal program will assist our marketing team next year by showing our personal commitment to the new project as they seek outside donations.

The donation program is modeled after the aircraft sponsor program outlined in the CAF Unit Manual. It will be composed of three donation levels:

1. Hangar Full Sponsor - \$3500

The Highest Member Donation Level of Support for the New Hangar Project

2. Hangar Constructor Sponsor- \$1750

A Second Level of Donations Where Members Show Their Significant Support for the New Hangar Project

3. Hangar Supporting Sponsor - \$350

The Third Level of Donations
That Allows Members to Support
the New Hangar Project

A member can start at say the Supporting Sponsor spot, have his/her name on the Supporting Sponsor Plaque. As they add to their donation over time, he/she can move up to Restoration Sponsor and so on. Their nameplate will then be moved to the appropriate plaque.

Any donation is welcome. There are several ways to make a hangar donation. One is to add it to your wing membership renewal form under 'other'. Another way is to send a donation check to the finance officer. In both cases note 'HANGAR FUND' on the paperwork or check so we know what it's for.

Three new plaques have been placed on the second floor wall at the top of the landing. Each plaque lists members who have already sent in a sponsorship for the new building.

Our goal is to have the majority if not all of our members names on the plaques. This will show prospective business donors that the membership is behind the program.

If you have already sent in a donation I would like to say thank you very much in advance and if you don't see your name on the plaque please contact me so I can ensure you are properly recognized.
