## **Operations Update**



Houston Wing attendance at the mandatory Annual Ground School 16-17 Feb was excellent. As a reminder, if you were not at this ground school you will not fly a CAF airplane in 2019.

If you attended another CAF Wing's Ground School you can get credit for the CRM portion of the school, but you still need the systems instruction. Please send me an email right away if you attended another Wing ground school and intend to fly a Houston Wing airplane in 2019.

Flight operations included a flyover of the AJCA Golf Tournament on 18 Feb led by Dave Guggemos in his T-34 with Chris Dowell and Craig Hutain in the U3, Gordon Richardson in Ace, Kevin Domingue and Greg Young in the Navion



Upcoming missions include our support of the annual Lock-N-Load Sporting Clays Tournament that supports the Texas Sentinels Foundation for wounded military veterans on 23 Mar. and the Blessing of the Fleet flyover on 31 Mar. The addition of ADS-B to the transponder system of all aircraft has begun. Wing Staff has selected the AT-6 and N3N as the next aircraft to be modified with ADS-B. Look forward to the rest of the Wing aircraft also being modified prior to the 31 Dec 2019 deadline.

Pilot sponsors and other volunteers can help during aircraft maintenance as directed by the Maintenance Officer. This work can include hands on the aircraft and also help identifying and ordering parts. It takes all of us working together to "Keep 'em flying!"

## **Safety Moment**



Things to keep in mind when you around the Hangar:

-If you see oil on the floor, please clean it up. We have plenty of rags and Varsol around to make the clean

quick and easy. Cleaning up the oil not only makes the hangar look presentable to our guests, but it also reduces the chances of any slipping or falling.

-If you see anything that is out of the ordinary around the hangar, then please say something. Safety should always be our number one priority.

-Cell phones. Please do not walk around the hangar while texting or playing games on your cellphone. This is simply not safe for you OR the aircraft. Earbuds are NOT to be used on the hangar floor. If you are outside and an aircraft is running, do not have your cell phone out unless you are snapping a quick picture, then please put it away.

-Pay attention to what is going on around you. Aircraft are dangerous and will hurt you bad or even kill you.

#### For Warbird Weekend:

-Please pay attention to all Marshallers and follow their directions. We will have lots of aircraft moving at various times in and out of the "Hot box." PLEASE be aware of what is going on around you.

-If you are working the Hot Box or around the aircraft, please keep your eyes out for our guest. They can be easily distracted and sometimes need a gentle reminder to stay off of the aircraft or to not smoke in inappropriate areas.


-The most important thing is to have fun and be safe. Please don't make me have to do paperwork! -Suzie B

## **Museum Moment**

#### WWI and WWII Uniforms

For a number of years we have had a WWI Uniform on display in the museum. We knew the identity of the uniform's owner as we had a copy of his discharge from the Army in WWI. This uniform belonged to Sargent James Migliavacca who was in the Quartermaster Corps during WWI. Displayed next to this uniform we had a fur collared winter flight jacket with a patch on it and we had no record or idea of where it came from or what unit the patch signified.

A few years ago after doing some research one of our volunteers located the jacket's patch and we discovered the patch was for the 596<sup>th</sup> Bombardment Squadron that flew B-26 "Marauder" medium bombers during WWII in Europe.





About three years ago during one of our Open Saturdays a lady came through the museum and was explaining to her children that one of these uniforms was her their grandfathers and the one next to it was their great grandfather's uniform. She explained that her father Jim Migliavacca was a TSgt and flight engineer on B-26s during WWII. She later sent us some copies of information about these two men which included a copy of a photo of the two of them (father and son) standing side by side in their military uniforms from both World Wars.



We hope you come by our Wing's Museum to see some of the unusual artifacts we have on display as our museum continues to grow. Our Museum volunteers will be happy to show you around the museum and will answer any questions you might have.
