Maintenance



Greetings once again from Hangar B5.

First off I would like to thank all of you for your support and trust in me as your Maintenance Officer. I look forward to a great 2020 with several of our project planes taking to the sky once again. That is what planes were designed and built to do. It has taken plenty of work and effort over several years by many members to get to this point, and I am happy that we have accomplished so much. For my report I wish to copy an excerpt from an article in a 2011 CAF Dispatch that says so many things so well. So here it is....

"Without question the most valuable asset the CAF owns would be the airplanes in its inventory. However, the backbone of the organization is the legion of individuals who dedicate themselves to keeping these demanding and temperamental old warriors flying. Without these mechanics, the CAF would be like any other static museum waiting for people to come to it, rather than our preferred method: bringing live history to the people.

There is no shortage of stories that typify the quality and character of these volunteer mechanics that stand front-and-center, always ready to do what it takes to keep these old relics alive. It often requires long days and short nights that result in busted up hands and wrecked clothes, but complaints are rarely forthcoming in spite of that.

We were all once outsiders looking in, and what we saw through that narrow field of view was the glamourous side of this warbird gig at airshows. It's doubtful most of us every gave a moment's thought to the maximum effort it took to get that airplane to the show. Behind every airplane is a legion of people working long hours, often under

less than ideal circumstances, to make it happen. The next time you're at an airshow, after you've greeted the 'Stick Activator,' take a few minutes to thank the people behind the scenes who made it possible for the airplane to be there!"

And on to other things, the BT-13 is almost done with her annual inspection. The brakes linings will be replaced on 7 Dec, and should be the end to the brake problems. Next in the order is the N3N, and it starts on 9 Dec. Right now the PT-19 center section is undergoing repair to the main spar and preparing to reskin the entire wing section. The fuselage is ready for cover, and the materials for that have been ordered. Work on the C-60 continues, and the right hydraulic shut off valve has been repaired. One more part will be installed to make it work reliably. The AT-6 is still operable at last check.

I am planning on holding a swing dance class on Sundays around 5 to 7 pm. If there is a showing, we will work on basic swing steps for the month along with some added moves to make the dance more interesting. Also I will be holding another rib stitching class in Jan. Most likely it will be on Sat Jan 12 in the morning. Please let me know if you wish to attend, so I can have supplies available.

Work around the hangar never stops, and I am thankful for all the help. We all work hard to make these planes fly. It requires more than just pilots and mechanics. It requires all the members who spend their valuable time supporting the wing through

PX, museum and all the work around here. It also includes the cadets, and their efforts to help in any way they can. New members are an asset to the unit too as they bring more skills to the team. Keep up the good work and 2020 will be a banner year for Houston Wing.....Jim

Remember that for
December's meeting we have the famous Houston Wing chili cook off and y'all got to beat our reigning champ from

Now this month is a lesson on our best employee. Clarice the chair. She hauls stuff and people up the stairs with narry a complaint. So to start. Say you want your heavy stuff or your behind hauled up. Step one is call her down. You will find her control sitting on the podium by the stairs. Pick it up and push the down button as you have now become an antenna so point it up at the chair and give it a few seconds and down she will come. Hold it down till she hits the stop at the bottom and makes a beep. That means she is on the contacts. Load her up. Make sure the foot rest is in the down position for loads and sitting. Push the up button on the control box or use the button on the right forward arm rest. Up we go. Let her go all the way up till she beeps. Then she is hitting the contacts and the battery will

charge. If no beep push the up button again to have her all the way up. That way the battery stays charged. Please see me at December meeting for any questions on her use. I use her to haul up cases of water and soda etc. I use her to come down when I am working in the hanger alone. Falling up the stairs not so bad but falling down would entail me doing paperwork. And we all know my first and only rule. Stay safe and don't make me fill out paperwork. —Suzie

Museum Moment

<u>Museum – "Little Known</u> <u>Aviation History"</u>

This Really Exists:
Giant Concrete Arrows That
Point Your Way Across
America...



Every so often, usually in the vast deserts of the American Southwest, a hiker or a backpacker will run across something puzzling: a large concrete arrow, as much as seventy feet in length, sitting in the middle of scrub-covered nowhere.



What are these giant arrows? Some kind of surveying mark?
Landing beacons for flying saucers?
Earth's turn signals?



No, it's...
The Transcontinental
Air Mail Route.




On August 20, 1920, the United States opened its first coast-to-coast airmail delivery route, just 60 years after the Pony Express closed up shop.

There were no good aviation charts in those days, so pilots had to eyeball their way across the country using landmarks. This meant that flying in bad weather was difficult, and night flying was just about impossible.

The Postal Service solved the problem with the world's first ground-based civilian navigation system: a series of lit beacons that would extend from

New York to San Francisco. Every ten miles, pilots would pass a bright yellow concrete arrow. Each arrow would be surmounted by a 51-foot steel tower and lit by a million-candlepower rotating beacon. (A generator shed at the tail of each arrow powered the beacon.)



Now mail could get from the Atlantic to the Pacific not in a matter of weeks, but in just 30 hours or so.

Even the dumbest of air mail pilots, it seems, could follow a series of bright yellow arrows straight out of a Tex Avery cartoon. By 1924, just a year after Congress funded it, the line of giant concrete markers stretched from Rock Springs, Wyoming to Cleveland, Ohio. The next summer, it reached all the way to New York, and by 1929 it spanned the continent uninterrupted, the envy of postal systems worldwide.



Radio and radar are, of course, infinitely less cool than a concrete Yellow Brick Road from sea to shining sea, but I think we all know how this story ends. New advances in communication and navigation technology made the big arrows obsolete, and the Commerce Department decommissioned the beacons in the 1940s. The steel towers were torn down and went to the war effort. But the hundreds of arrows remain. Their yellow paint is gone, their concrete cracks a little more with every winter frost, and no one crosses their path much, except for coyotes and tumbleweeds.

But they're still out there.

Gate Entry Process

Here are a few options:

- 1. If the gate is down and the guard is in the shack, all you need to do is tell the guard that you are going to Hangar B-5 with the CAF and they will open the gate.
- 2. The gate is supposed to remain open if there is no guard in the shack. Simply drive on in. If this is not the case, then see option 3
- 3. If the gate is down and there is NO guard in the shack, simply press the "Call Button" on the silver box near the guard shack. When they answer, tell them that you are with the CAF in hangar B-5 and they will open the gate for you.
