Museum Moment

German Helmet (Damaged)

We were recently contacted by Matt Jones who wanted to donate several of his father's items to our museum. His father, Trevor "T.O." Jones, was too young to be in the service during WWII but he was interested in the military and he kept a large scrapbook with clippings about the war and the post war period. In addition to the scrap book, he had a rusted and shot up German helmet that he had found during a camping trip in Libya in the mid-1960s when he was there working for ESSO. He had kept the scrap book and helmet for years and his son wanted somebody to have them. We are currently reviewing his scrapbook looking for newspaper clippings that would apply or be of interest to our WWII mission. The damaged and rusted German helmet is a unique artifact and we have decided to display it as is in the German display cabinet.



Aviator Safety Corner

NATA Accident Rates Study for North American Aircraft

NATA conducted analysis of the 10 year mishap database of all North American Aviation trainer aircraft to determine the most common probable causes of our mishaps. The top 3 probable causes of our NATA mishaps are loss of control during landings (22 mishaps), engine failures (11 mishaps), and failure to maintain control in flight (8 mishaps). Only 2 mishaps were attributed to physiological incapacitation (Medical), and only 3 mishaps occurred during formation flights (1 during landing, 1 while taxiing, and 1 during climb-out).

We also scanned the database for the most common causes of fatal mishaps. Not surprisingly, the highest loss of life over the last 10 years came from mishaps caused by loss of control in flight, low altitude maneuvering, or acrobatics (13 fatalities),

followed by mid-air collision (5 fatalities), and forced landings due to engine failure/loss of power (4 fatalities). One mishap was caused by a failure of a flight control component during an air race and resulted in 11 fatalities and 66 injuries.

Mishaps by Probable Cause

22	Landing mishaps involving Ground Loops, Crosswinds, or Loss of control
11	Engine Failures leading to forced landings
8	Failure to Maintain Control in flight (Scud running, loss of control while maneuvering, failure to maintain sufficient airspeed)
5	While Taxiing (3 incidents)
4	While Taking off
3	Formation related mishaps:
	1 involving collision during landing (2 reports)
	1 involving collision while taxiing (2 reports)
	1 involving mid-air during take-off (does not specifically state in formation, but assumed)
2	Maintenance related mishaps (1 inflight (elevator hinge), 1 while landing (tailwheel assembly))
2	Controlled Flight Into Terrain (CFIT)
2	Physiological incapacitation

Fatal Mishaps by Probable Cause

13	Loss of Control in flight, Low Altitude Maneuvering, or Acrobatics
5	Mid-air Collision
4	Engine Failure/loss of power
2	Physiological incapacitation
2	Controlled flight into terrain (CFIT)
1	Hard Landing

So what do all these numbers tell us? The most likely mishap in a NATA aircraft occurs during the landing phase of flight (22 mishaps) but landing mishaps are the least deadly with only 1 fatality. The second most likely mishap - Engine Failure (11 mishaps) – resulted in 4 fatalities. And the third most likely mishap - Failure to maintain control in flight (8 mishaps) – was the most deadly with 13 fatalities. This data also indicates that we are generally in good health and we generally safe when flying formation. This data points us to 3 areas needing improvement:

- 1. We need to improve our safety record in the Landing phase of flight;
- 2. We need to improve our safety record during low altitude maneuvering and acrobatic flight;
- 3. We need to determine the primary causes (if possible) of our engine failures.

Improving our safety record is a priority in NATA, and we will invest our time and resources to the areas that will have the largest positive impact on our safety record.

Now is the time for each of us to take stock of our own flying skills – Am I current? Am I proficient? When was the last time I performed a complete stall series? When was the last time I practiced a no-flap landing or a simulated engine out landing? The last time I flew formation, was I as good as when I first got my qualification? Now is the time to consider what proactive steps YOU will take between now and when you get back in the air.

None of this is rocket science – but it does require discipline and a commitment to periodically hit the books, seek refresher training in the cockpit, and take a closer look at our aircraft.


