

Airman of the Year

Criteria: To the Wing Colonel who most exemplifies the qualities desired and required of CAF pilots, Maintenance or Restoration personnel. CAF pilots will have given freely of their time in flying one or more CAF aircraft at Wing and/or CAF events in accomplishing the CAF objective of displaying our aircraft to the nation. All flight must have been accomplished in a safe and accident free manner. Maintenance or Restoration personnel will have given freely of their time and talents in maintaining and restoring CAF aircraft in a manner that brings credit upon the CAF by all that view their work.

New Member of the Year

Criteria: To the Wing Colonel or Cadet who most exemplifies the team effort and the qualities desired by all CAF members. They will have given freely of their time and talents. They exemplify the willingness to jump in and help with anything that is needed at the time.

Jim Levine Esprit de Corps Award

Criteria: Esprit de Corps is defined as a common spirit of enthusiasm, commitment and devotion to a cause among a group. In other words, feeling that you are a part of the team. The Jim Levine Esprit de Corps Award recognizes the Wing Colonel whose actions and contributions best foster this spirit within the Wing.

Craig Pridgeon Award


eration in this request.

Your aircraft and hangar maintainers have been busy this past month. The meeting room remodel is almost complete with the exception of some minor trim work to finish. The room has new windows, a better sealed wall structure for heating and cooling efficiency, new floor, new paint, and electri-

cal sockets replaced. Be sure to thank Dana Cleland and his crew for taking on this job. It was quite a chore with a short timeline to complete, but they pulled it off.

Our AT-6 and BT-13 returned from Wings Over Houston without any big squawks. This makes the maintainers happy as we are busy with the fast approaching PT-19 final assembly. While at Wings Over Houston, our BT-13 pilot Wayne Loeber talked with another BT-13 driver John Heitz about some cowl fitting issues he had noticed. John is an IA and owns a BT-15 which has a similar design to our BT-13. He came over to the hangar on Sunday morning to meet with Wayne, Lisa Sanford, and George Ducommum. They found several areas on the cowling that needed attention mostly due to wear and tear. The team will be installing new leather and felt spacers as well as replacing some worn sheet metal parts. John will be available in the future to advise our maintenance team on some of the non-standard issues we face from time to time

Winter maintenance activities start in December. Several projects need to be completed by mid-Spring, so we are scheduling the Wing's flying aircraft annuals for January through April (AT-6 and BT-13). The idea is to complete several small annoying non-safety repairs prior to the Annual Inspections. This will keep the aircraft on active flying status as long as practical. The Maintenance Department will coordinate with Operations on the schedule.

There will be a maintenance meeting on Saturday, December 10, at 10 am in the Houston Wing meeting room. All Houston Wing maintainers are encouraged to attend. I promise to limit the PowerPoint presentation to no more than 8 slides. Topics to include a LIVE DEMO on how to get into the CAF Operations website and navigate the maintenance side, Rally Point from a maintainer point of view, who needs to be on the drug program, and a quick look at CAFR 66-1. We will also look at the project list and seek volunteers to tackle some of the tasks. The list includes aircraft and hangar projects. [Editorial note: you don't have to be an A&P or an expert car mechanic to help on the maintenance staff. I'm slowly becoming a useful wrench monkey! -Field]

Keep 'em flying and be kind to each other.



der Ops Forms in: cafoperations.org/document-resources. Plus complete your 60-1 and 66-1 CAF online training and bring your completion certificates: cafoperations.org/training. Pilots will need to bring photocopies of their current medical, pilot certificate, and flight review logbook endorsement. You will also need to pre-register with me if taking the N3N, BT-13 and AT-6A training, so I can send you the prep work (test questions and slide deck).

A NATA Formation clinic is planned at TME on 2-5 March. Further details, including registration details, may be found on the NATA web site. We continue to plan our Warbird Weekend on 15-16 April, with invitations already emailed, and a follow up planned for those we have yet to hear back from.

Finally, regarding the armament for Ace, you are probably aware that we have the gun camera (Item 2 in the image). Now, we are working on getting the gun (Items 11-13)! This will bring Ace closer to the RCAF configuration she was initially built for. X

I've had a ball this past year as PIO and aspiring maintenance wrench-monkey. A few pictures didn't make it into the previous newsletter or into the write-


ups for the MX section due to publishing timelines, so I'll include them here!

NATA Clinic

NATA is planning to hold a Formation Clinic at KTME on March 3-5, 2023. We held our first Houston area NATA clinic at KTME earlier this year, and the 2023 clinic will be a similar venue.

As most of you already know, the CAF is a FAST signatory, also known as

TRARON. TRARON pretty much follows NATA's lead in procedures and qualification requirements, including NATA's policies.

The Houston NATA Clinic is scheduled to be held on Thursday March 2, 2023 through on Sunday March 5, 2023. The Houston Executive Airport (KTME) has a long, 6600 ft. x 100 ft. wide runway, good airspace availability, and a control tower. The local FBO, Henriksen Jet Center, has graciously agreed to host our clinic again. The formal advertisement for this clinic should be placed on the NATA website and be run in their *Skylines* magazine at the next opportunity.

One key requirement is that participants need to be a NATA formation member. That can all be done online. The NATA website has some of the best information concerning how they run their clinics and what pilots who attend their clinics should expect. Remember that when you show up for a clinic, all the NATA check pilots and instructor pilots may not be familiar with your level of experience and competence.

Some key issues are:

- 1. Training logs show key milestones such as single ship check outs, two ship experience and qualifications, and then the four ship qualifications as well as recommendations for a check ride and check rides themselves. NATA requires check pilot approvals to be from NATA approved check pilots.
- 2. Wing candidates (all of us) should have watched the NATA 2012 Formation video recently.
- 3. All participants in the clinic should have a copy, read, and study the Formation Knowledge Guide (FKG) version 2.0 This document has been included on the NATA website as well as websites for most other signatories (including cafoperations.org). Signatories can adjust the techniques for accomplishing the required FAST maneuvers by adding aircraft specific Type Supplements (Appendix D's to the FKG). Those have been completed for T-6, T-28, and Navion aircraft. Since many of our formation flights are with dissimilar aircraft, these are required reading for all attendees.
- 4. The FAST document titled "FAST Airshow and Operations (Revision 2, February 2021) is available on the FAST and NATA websites. The FAST card entitles the pilot to fly in airshow, so this document has now been updated and will likely be a topic of the oral portion of any checkride. A written test on this material is a requirement for all NATA FAST card reissuances.

The NATA board of directors has issued a requirement for NATA FAST card reissuance that lead pilots must attend a NATA clinic every 2 years (also recommended for wing pilots).

The biggest consideration for making the most of a NATA clinic is to come to it fully prepared. Whether you just want to maintain FAST currency or have expectations of upgrading your FAST card, some preparatory formation flights are highly recommended. Perhaps you may need more than one preparatory flight.



We will do our best here at the Houston Wing to try to accommodate and schedule some formation flights prior to the clinic for those who wish it. If you get your formation flying documentation and skills up to date, that will also facilitate your clinic experience. How many formation hours do you have, what kinds of formation flights, and are you just flying around with a couple buddies or are you flying rigorous formation training flights with the full "trainer profile"?

Formation flying is serious and demanding business, and requires a high level of devotion to preparation and continuing practice.

I would also like to ask for volunteers to help with the admin duties and food handling at the clinic. Please contact me separately and I will be glad to discuss.

One of the Houston Wing's major activities is conducting formation flights for various events and clients in the area. It is a goal of mine to try to expand the number of folks qualified to perform formation flights. The visibility we receive from those kind of flights adds to our overall reputation and aids in the performance of our mission statement to "Educate, Inspire, and Honor."
